Executive Summary

God continues to bless this ministry. As a result of generous donations, we were able to provide agricultural, medical, and educational support to the poor in Zimbabwe, Tanzania, Laos, Kenya, and Pakistan. Our donor base is expanding, and we have received many in-kind donations. We have a good pool of volunteers that help prepare and load containers, with many people from various churches helping on several workdays. Our overhead costs remain low, and are about 1% of our budget. In most projects we require the recipients to

Accomplishments

Past work includes sending containers of agricultural and medical supplies to Zimbabwe and Laos (2011 to present). We sent about 1 million meals to the Dadaab refugee camp in Kenya at the height of the famine in neighboring countries (2011). Several water well have been funded in Tanzania (2011 to present). We built a school study house in Tanzania, and pay primary,

secondary, and college tuition for many kids there. For most kids, we require relatives to pay a portion of their tuition. We have worked in Tanzania, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Kenya, Pakistan, and India. Current projects are discussed by country below.

Tanzania. Most of our efforts in Tanzania are overseen by Sebald Mteteleka and Fr. Salutaris Mpinge. Sebald manages finances for projects at the Ifaraka Health Institute and started the Valenova Foundation several years ago. Fr. Salutaris teaches at a University in Dar es Salaam. Both Sebald and Fr. Salutaris have oversight from friends we have in the area.

We continue to pay college tuition for 3 students, and primary and secondary school tuition for about 50 kids. This includes paying tuition for children whose parents have leprosy.

We funded the drilling of another water well in the Tanzania area through MSABI. This group requires the village to supply labor to drill the well, and uses hand pumps manufactured locally using local materials.



We also started working with an orphanage in Bagamoyo, and funded a water well so they didn't have to carry water each day for their

basic needs.

Kenya. We support a village in Kenya through IcFEM (Interchristian Fellowships' Evangelical Mission). This indigenous group works through community leaders to affect change in their village. Their motto is "Holy Living and Hard Work". We visited this mission several years ago, and were impressed with their approach to missions.

We provided funds support to buy a man an artificial leg who had been attached by a hippopotamus. We also provided funds for a lady to receive treatment for kidney problems.

A soap and candle-making training class was also funded by us. This training helped young people learn a trade to help them be self-sufficient.

Kiyongwile school requested help to fund a school program since the kids often have very little to eat at home, and nothing at school. We shared the expenses of this program with friends in England.

> **Pakistan**. We began a project in southern Pakistan to provide sewing machines to 10 widows or elderly people so they can earn a living in this impoverished country where Christians lack many basic freedoms. We will pay rent for 1-2 years for a building for another sewing center until they can generate income to pay rent on their own as they become self-sufficient.

Nepal. We met a young man at KSU whose father is a minister in Nepal. Through that connection, we now pay tuition for 3 Nepal boys to attend boarding school.

Laos. We shipped a load of grain bins to Laos, and obtained more bins from Nebraska and Geneseo, KS, that will shipped to establish "Harvest Centers". A ministry there established business to build relationships with local farmers. We hosted two Laotians this summer and

gave them training in grain storage techniques. We also took them to various agricultural enterprises including equipment manufacturers in Clay Center. We hope to continue supporting this "Business as Missions" concept.

Zimbabwe. We shipped a 40 ft container of agricultural equipment, medical supplies, orphan gifts, a large 60hp Ford Tractor, John Deere No-Till planter, wheelchairs, and year supply of Kids Against Hunger meals (80,000) to Eden Children's Village (ECV). We continue to help this orphanage be more selfsustaining through. ECV supports over 100 orphans and employs over 100 people in the local area. Kevin and Susan Fry, who started and oversee ECV, visited

here for a few days in November. We had about 100 wheelchairs donated by Joni Erikson Tada's Wheels for the World for the clinic that serves this orphanage and the surrounding community.

Syria. We sent funds to support refugees from the Syria conflict.

Other projects. We frequently provide consulting services to other missions seeking advice on shipping items to developing countries, and we answer many questions on how to improve production and reduce losses for subsistence farmers. We have also met with or hosted missionaries serving in Zimbabwe and Mexico. We also distribute Bibles on all trips as our main goal is to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

We have had about 56 donors in 2013. 18% of our donors gave 84% of the total budget. Our donors include 5 churches.

The average donation was \$774, with the minimum=\$10 and maximum=\$20,000.

We will likely send containers of agricultural equipment and medical supplies to Zimbabwe and Laos. We likely will continue providing tuition for kids that have no source of income, send medical supplies to various missions, and provide agricultural support to improve food security in various countries. All this will be done with the emphasis of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ through ministering to those in need. Whenever possible, we will require recipients to share in the cost these projects.
